Year 11

Today all Year 11 students will have received a revision guide "Pathway to Success" which provides valuable advice and guidance about the final few weeks of this term, exam formats, revision sessions, study leave and revision tips. A copy of this booklet is also available on the website.

A reminder that we are running an Easter Revision School on Monday 10 and Tuesday 11 April from 8:50am to 1:30pm. We hope all students will be able to attend these valuable sessions in the run up to the exam period. Please complete and return the attendance slip as soon as possible.

Forthcoming notice that on Tuesday 30 May, we will be running a maths revision day; specific details to follow.

School Funding

You may have seen the coverage in the local and national press about school funding. It is the biggest area of concern at the moment in every school. As parents, it is important that you are aware of our situation as a school, and the impact on education in general.

Background

Since 2012 schools have accepted our duty to assist with the implementation of the cuts necessary to help stabilise the nation's finances. Whilst they have been painful, by and large we have kept our concerns to ourselves and done the best we can in the interests of the communities we serve.

However, the current situation and the prospects for the future are dire for all state schools. The government repeatedly makes three claims in response to questions about school funding:

1. The National Funding Formula will end historic discrepancies and make the system fairer.
2. The government has protected core schools' funding "and it is now at a record level - more than £40bn this year".
3. There is significant scope for schools to make efficiencies

Dealing with each of these in turn:

The National Funding Formula does not involve an increase in school funding nationally, but rather a re-distribution of inadequate funding. In the second stage consultation which details how this new formula will be calculated, the majority of secondary schools in North Yorkshire will see a cut. At St. John Fisher we will see a 0.9% cut. We are already the lowest funded school in a low funded local authority – this will be cut further.

'Core school funding' is a clever turn of phrase the government uses. It refers only to 11-16 education. There have been enormous cuts to 16-19 (sixth form) 'per pupil funding' since 2012. Also, as there are record numbers of students in the countries schools it is no wonder that the amount is at record levels, however the amount we have to spend per pupil is less.



We do not contest that in a difficult economic climate efficiencies were necessary. Indeed since 2012 we have been making these efficiencies in every possible area of school spending. Make no mistake about it however, for most schools, the 'efficiencies' which the government now speak of can only mean much larger classes or loss of subjects as a result of employing even fewer staff.

Set out below, to enable you to unpick the rhetoric, is the extent of the increases in costs and cuts that schools have been managing.

- Sixth Form funding has been reduced by 12%.
- In 2012 there was a cap on public sector pay rises at 1%. These 1% pay rises are awarded each year but unfunded; this means that schools are paying more every year for the same staff and have to cut other areas of school life to pay for this.
- The government has recently introduced a 0.5% Apprenticeship Levy which applies to all institutions with a pay roll of over £3 million. This applies to most secondary schools and is unfunded. This means, again, we have to cut other areas of school life.
- The Education Services Grant (ESG) has been removed. This was £77 per pupil to provide essential services. This is a straight forward cut.
- There has been an increase in employer contributions to National Insurance, the Teachers' Pension Scheme and Local Government Pension Scheme. This is likely to continue. These extra costs for large secondary schools comes to over half a million pounds each year (compared to three years ago).

In summary, 6th Form Funding has been reduced by 12% and 11 to 16 funding by 8%. The 'fair funding formula' removes another 0.9%. These are not my figures, they are from the IFS who have independently reviewed spending.

How can you help?

I have written to the MP, responded to the consultation on fair funding and made my feelings known in the local and national press. I would urge you to write to your MP – and express your concerns. Seek assurances that:

- Schools will no longer be hit with unfunded increases in staffing costs
- Lobby for an exemption from the Apprenticeship Levy.

Our local MP has been very supportive and is sympathetic to our concerns, but we need to continue to lobby elected members otherwise all schools will cease to function as they do now.

Y8 Boys Football

The Cup Double is on!

The Y8 boys football team over the period of 7 days secured a place in both the Area and County Cup finals with two hard fought semi-final victories.

On Monday 13 March, the boys travelled to a physically strong King James, Knaresborough side in the Area Cup and prevailed 3-1 after extra time. Jonny Shepherd's free kick was cancelled out by a King James penalty which took the game into extra time but a stunning long range effort from man of the match Will Hugill put Fisher's in control. Keenan Carole finished off a flowing team move to seal the win and put the team in their first final.

This achievement was eclipsed 7 days later when the boys triumphed against local rivals St Aidan's with a deserved 3-1 victory at Harrogate Town. A powerful run and shot from Davide Santoro was deflected into the path of Callum Hodgson who slotted home to give Fisher's a first half lead. Santoro's pace was too much for the Aidan's defence as he broke the offside trap in the second half to steer the ball past the on-rushing keeper to put Fishers in control. Carole put the icing on the cake with a superb long range curling finish to settle the contest and despite a late consolation the result was never in doubt.

A fantastic week for the A and the B teams with both teams reaching the Charity Cup Final, only the 2nd time this has happened for the school.

I hope everyone will make a big effort to come to the final. Fishers B will get 166 start.

The Fishers B team of Tom Hudson, George Asbury and Matthew Lynch had the easier match, beating 2nd Division high flyers Harrogate Racquets E 451-352. An unusual score line for a handicap event, but not for this team who have done it for 4 matches in a row. George was excellent, finishing with 3 game wins from 6 games, and a +64 overall total. Matthew despite a tough handicap ended on +20, and Tom, bravely battling on despite a sore eye affecting his vision, on +15.

The A Team of Dale and George Gibson and Sammy Kelly, had a much closer match, coming from a -192 handicap to prevail in the final game of the match against Division 5 leaders Sharow B. In front of a noisy crowd, the big lead was whittled down to 7 points for the final match. Dale pulled the team clear by 5 points with the final game to play, and the tie was won by 378—363. Sammy Kelly played the best I have seen him play to end on +22, George on +1 and Dale -8.

English Schools Cup - Last 16 Semi-Final Stage at Grantham

Fishers U16 team interest ended when the team of Sammy Kelly, Matthew Lynch, Tom Hudson and George Asbury did not qualify for the Finals. But were in the last 16 of schools in the country, so a great achievement to get so far.

They lost to Ackworth School, (England Cadet School – England Juniors) by 0-8 who easily won all 3 matches to qualify for the 4 team final.

Against Wellingborough College the team lost 2-6 Sammy winning both of his matches, then 3-5 to St Bede's Blackburn, Sammy winning both of his matches, and George 1. Matthew and Tom came close to their opening win. A good day was had by all.

News from the Science Desk – March/April 2017

Year 7

Year 8

A short reminder that the revision resources below are still open to Y8. Y8 will find these increasingly useful as they experience the more complicated topics that they encounter. Both years will find these particularly useful when they come to prepare for end of unit and end of year tests.

Revision Material for Year 7 and 8

The two books above can be obtained for a combined price of £7.50 from the Science prep room, and will allow pupils to consolidate their understanding in addition to the support material and worksheets for the whole key stage in the KS3 area of the VLE. We have now put these on parent pay also, should you choose this option, please print out the relevant screen and send in with your son/daughter to collect the books.

The VLE does NOT require a log in, please follow the links that are open to all members of the public from the school website.

Year 9

Revision Guides and Workbook together for Combined Science (£10), and Revision Guide and Workbook for each of Biology, Chemistry and Physics (£4 each) are now available. If you are unsure as to which is the most suitable then the class teacher will be able to advise accordingly.

We will continue to assess Y9 over the year, but there will be no wholesale changes of set, until pupils sit an end of year test in the summer, which will give us an indication of those who should pursue separate science and those for whom combined science is more appropriate.



Year 10

The next important date is the whole year mocks in April. In Science this will consist of 1hr examinations in each of Biology, Chemistry and Physics, testing pupils on both Y9 work and Y10 work. Pupils have been issued with revision lists, and can use these in conjunction with the appropriate revision guides and work books.

We will tier these to Separates/Higher Combines to allow movement between these sets, and Foundation Combined. If in doubt pupils will sit the higher tier to allow us to assess their comprehension of the harder style questions.

We would like all pupils to reach their full potential and to achieve the highest grade of which they are capable, and thus make every attempt to ensure that pupils are on the most appropriate course for them. The new specification is of increased rigour, requires deeper levels of knowledge (including some A-level standard concepts), and requires the ability to remember and rearrange a number of equations.

We have identified suitable revision guides and work books for the new curriculum. We will carry a rolling stock of books that are suitable for Revision Guide and Workbook together for Combined Science (£10), and Revision Guide and Workbook for each of Biology, Chemistry and Physics (£4 each). If you are unsure as to which is the most suitable then the class teacher will be able to advise accordingly.

Pupils will continue to have access to Kerboodle which will provide on-line text books supporting the new specification together with a suite of further resources which are very useful if accessed.

Year 11

REVISE!!

We are now entering the closing stages of GCSE. All pupils will have now completed the course content, or be in the final phases, such that they can now **REVISE**.

In order to help pupils **REVISE**, we are running teacher-led sessions on Monday, Thursday and Friday lunch times, to which ALL pupils are invited. After school sessions are on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, from 3.45pm to 4.45pm, ALL pupils are invited to these also.

These opportunities will run for the remaining two weeks of this term and then the three weeks of next term that run in to the exam period. I would have expected higher numbers to attend, and remain somewhat disappointed that more have not availed themselves of these sessions

Where there are concerns that an ISA mark will not support examination performance, an opportunity will be offered to at Easter to undertake a third ISA for Core and/or Additional Science, on the Monday and Tuesday respectively. Where there are similar concerns for those studying separates, pupils will be required to complete a further ISA either over a series of lunch times or after school. Separate pupils will be given **REVISION** opportunities on the Tuesday of Easter School, on Biology, Chemistry and Physics.

- **REVISE using Getrevising.co.uk**
- **REVISE by coming to the sessions at lunchtime and after school.**
- **REVISE by coming to the sessions that will be offered prior to each examination**

Which subjects can give me the most options at University?

Many courses at university level build on knowledge and skills which you will gain while still at school.

Where this is the case, universities need to make sure that all the students they admit have prepared themselves in the best way to cope with their chosen course. For this reason, some university courses may require you to have studied a specific subject prior to entry, others may not. However, there are some subjects that are required more often than others. These subjects are sometimes referred to as facilitating subjects.

Subjects that can be viewed as facilitating subjects are:

- Mathematics and Further Mathematics
- English Literature
- Physics
- Biology
- Chemistry
- Geography
- History
- Languages (Classical and Modern)

You don't necessarily need to have studied three facilitating subjects at A-level. Some courses require one or two facilitating subjects, whilst for other courses there are no specific subject requirements.

If you don't know what you want to study then it's a really good rule of thumb that taking two facilitating subjects will keep a wide range of degree courses open to you.


VLE

On the KS3 area of the VLE are support materials, the first of the support materials is an interactive booklet and requires students to log on using their school log on, and a password of 'password' until changed, the second of which provides summary/revision sheets for the appropriate topics.

1. Click on either of these two tabs on the school website.




2.Scroll down and click on Student VLE:




3.Scroll down to Science

The interactive book requires a log in which is the same as students' email address (Year of start at SJF, first 5 surname letters, initial – e.g. 09TanneR), with password set as password until changed. There have been some technical issues with some PC software issues for this resource, so if there are any problems do use the 2nd resource.

The Science revision sheets **do not** require a login, and can be printed out, with the answers at the end of the resource.
